The body /not/ at home

The workshop on "The body /not/ at home" investigates how film, theatre and literature negotiate bodies that are not 'at home' – both in terms of practical reality as well as in a metaphorical sense. In an age of accelerating mobility, which coincides with an increase in refugee populations alongside greater economic and mental insecurity across the board, the proposed topic is of particular socio-political importance and opens up a series of critical questions:

What representations are chosen in literature, art and film to depict these displacements 'from the inside out'? How are these states of out-of-placeness, homelessness, statelessness and liminality displayed? What kinds of images are evoked when portraying such 'borderline'-cases? And what happens if, even after death, a body can't find peace or, more aptly in this context, can't find its way 'back home'? Maybe the dramatically growing interest in vampires, zombies and other undead creatures is linked to this impossibility of identifying and locating oneself in this unstable world?

Following the debates on issues of 'nomadic existences' that engage with post-structuralism, post-colonialism and subject theory, the workshop traces theoretically-based and politically-in-formed readings of modern texts, films and performances dealing with the problem of subjects 'abroad'.
